Mary D. Ameen, NJTPA Executive Director

Mary D. Ameen is the Executive Director of the North Jersey Transportation Planning Authority (NJTPA) and a transportation professional with more than thirty years of public sector leadership experience, and a multi-disciplinary background in engineering, management, and law. Ameen joined the NJTPA in 2006 as Director of External Affairs, coordinating staff involvement and external agency liaison for one of the nation's largest Metropolitan Planning Organizations (MPOs). Ameen also directed the NJTPA's Department of Systems Planning, Programing and Operations. Additionally, she is an active participant in the I-95 Corridor Coalition and the Traveler Information Services Program Track Committee. Ameen is licensed as a Professional Engineer in New Jersey, and she is admitted to practice law in the State of New Jersey and in the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania. She is a Fellow in the Institute of Transportation Engineers.

Michael J. Manzella, PP, AICP

Michael J. Manzella, PP, AICP is the Director of Transportation for the City of Asbury Park. He manages all transportation activities and projects in Asbury Park, and serves on the city's Planning Board, Parking Committee and Mayor's Wellness Committee. In this role, he manages the city's parking operations and focuses on improving pedestrian and bicycle safety, mobility and access. Manzella graduated from the Bloustein School of Planning and Public Policy at Rutgers University with a master's degree in city and regional planning in 2014; since then he has worked on transportation planning and traffic engineering projects in both the private and public sectors.
